Name(s) **Project Number** Lianne R. Sturgeon 31010 **Project Title** Plaque's Preference: How Do Sucrose, Honey, and Splenda Affect the **Growth Rate of Streptococcus mutans? Abstract** Objectives/Goals The purpose of my experiment was to determine which commonly available food swe etener, table sugar (sucrose), Splenda (Sucralose), or honey, was least likely to promote the growth of treptococcus mutans. Methods/Materials Streptococcus mutans was inoculated onto plates of Trypticase Sox Agar (TSA) media with either 2% honey, 2% sucrose, or 2% sucralose. Plain plates of TSA were inoculated as a control. Plates were incubated at body temperature for 152 hours. The diameter of each of the colonies was measure to determine the amount of growth in each environment. **Results** Sucrose grew the biggest colonies of the sweeteners and honey the small st colonies. The control grew the biggest colonies. **Conclusions/Discussion** Honey was been shown to have antibacterial properties which may have been the reason for the smaller colonies. Sucrose is a highly refined sugar which bacteria can use efficiently. Sucralose, when packaged as Splenda, has maltodextrin and dextrose added to it. The bacteria may not have used the sucralose, but grew off the added sugars instead. it is not clear way the control grew the biggest colonies unless adding sugar to the medium threw off the balance of autients to water.
